Keep the feedback coming! We need it. We love it. We get better with it!



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
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
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
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# Top 17 Escapes to... Get Away from It All

WHEREVER collects the gems to hide away in when you really want to get far from the madding crowds.

## Herdade da Malhadinha Nova, Alentejo, Portugal

Having heard all about the Herdade da Malhadinha Nova, it was high time to check in. Located in Albernó, Beja, in the heart of the Baixo Alentejo, the estate spreads across an impressive 610 hectares. It's clear as soon as you drive up its long driveway, past the olive groves, overlooking the vineyards in the distance, that this is a place like no other. A vast oasis where the love of nature, food, wine and time is key.

With five different types of accommodations, everyone can find their match. Each has their own unique character and size. But most of all the estate offers space, heaps of space. That is true luxury. A feeling of seclusion and freedom unparalleled.

In Casa do Ancoradouro, we make a home in one of the seven suites. They are spacious, comfortable and simply chic, all terracotta floors and white linens. In the common area, you'll find a pool, a Bulthaup kitchen, a Steinway & Sons grand piano from 1900 — just in case — and a huge Living Divani sofa to kick back on. At breakfast time, the team is there to welcome you with a plethora of local goodies, fruit, breads and eggs. Bliss.

Don't miss dinner at Eleven Restaurant where executive Chef Joachim Koerper has just earned a Michelin star. Well deserved. Local seasonal produce and attention to detail makes for an unforgettable experience. With an organic and self-sufficient production, the restaurant serves wines, olive oil and honey, as well as a variety of cereals, Alentejo beef, Merino sheep and the black pig, all with PDO (protected designations of origin), as well as vegetables and fruit from the gardens and orchards. From the beef tartare to the black pork loin served with confit potatoes and glazed carrots, to the Lamb with grilled cabbage, or the chicken with fresh cheese and thyme ravioli — each dish a delight. A special nod to the chocolate textures — cream, brownie and coulis served with fresh strawberries. And, it goes without saying, that the Herdade's own wine was perfectly suited.


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## Kilindi, Zanzibar




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## Aleenta Hua Hin Pranburi Resort & Spa, Thailand



# OLD SCHOOL EXPLORER

Author, explorer and BBC presenter Benedict Allen has been called 'Britain's most fearless man'. He tells WHEREVER's Rowena Carr-Allinson what makes him tick.

**B**enedict Allen is often compared to the proverbial cat with nine lives. His adventures have taken him from the Namibian Skeleton coast, to the Gobi desert, across the Amazon and making 'first contact' with remote tribes in New Guinea.

The explorer is best known for disappearing (literally) in the world's most inhospitable locations on Indiana Jones style adventures. He has published several books, including *Explorer: The Quest for Adventure* and the *Great Unknown*, *The Faber Book of Exploration*, and *Into the Abyss* based on his experience crossing Siberia with a pack of sledge dogs.

So, what exactly drives a man to head solo to the Peruvian Amazon and walk 1,000 miles across Siberia? Allen's forays into the unknown are born of a desire to find out what makes people tick. What keeps people keep going day after day, especially in tough conditions?

His real preoccupation is with survival 'because I've had many narrow squeaks throughout my career'. His 'squeaks', as he quaintly refers to them, include getting shot at by Pablo Escobar's henchmen, being poisoned in the Peruvian Amazon, and having to eat his dog or face starvation, not to mention having contracted Malaria and Dengue fever in Papua New Guinea. But, he's quick to point out that his biggest problem has always been people: 'all the times I've almost died it's never been a natural thing, never a snake or piranhas, always people... Gold miners, loggers, drug barons: opportunists.'

To comprehend survival, he chooses the most inhospitable territories such as Siberia. 'It is generally a symbol of hell on earth. We think of the gulags and the tortuous places, but there are people living out there. It's their home.'

Adapting to his local environment is Allen's secret. He 'learns from local people to adapt to local ways'. He doesn't take this lightly, even undergoing rites of passage such as the 'crocodile initiation' ceremony in New Guinea, which is as painful as it sounds.

Filming his own material for documentaries, Allen travels alone without a satellite phone, GPS or any other useful gadgets. Going solo enables him to experience the authentic. 'It

works because I'm not a threat. I'm simply me. I'm very vulnerable. I don't have a gun, I just potter along'.

Pottering along seems to put him in harm's way more often than not. Does this make him courageous or just plain crazy? 'I do risky things but not as many as anyone thinks. But fear is a good thing to have. I do feel fear!'

Allen's approach to life, death and survival is admirable. He is serene. Recently bereaved, he admits that some people 'cope better than others'. And he is clearly one of the former.

Before travelling he packs an all important 'survival file'. It is 'full of quotes and cuttings from explorers and ordinary people who have said things about what it is to live through disaster'. Useful inspiration no doubt, when, one night, during a squall, Allen got separated from his dogs. He remembers: 'through the night I was wondering if I'd find the dogs the next morning, if I'd survive. I had to come up with a purpose to get out.' The dogs became both the means and motivation to survive. 'They were the most important thing for me. They had become more than just dogs, they had become professional colleagues. I had become part of their pack.'

Turning back due to the abysmal weather conditions, for his own sake as for that of the dogs, Benedict cut his expedition 50 miles short. A wise decision he didn't regret: 'I had these two wonderful days coming back out of danger on the Bering Strait. I felt this camaraderie with these dogs and felt what it was like to be given back life.'

He concludes that survival is 'about two things: having a purpose allied with belief. You have to believe that it's possible that you can survive.'

Benedict still hasn't cured his wanderlust. The bug's been with him since childhood, when his father, a test pilot, brought fascinating exotic souvenirs home.

He admits 'it's tempting to rewrite one's childhood' but wanting to become an explorer was always there: 'no doubt about it!' The main hurdle was financial. Working in a warehouse funded a first trip, and so too, the first of nine books. Allen was hooked. 'I couldn't think of anything that would be quite as exciting again'. >

However, organising expeditions and being away for months at a time is getting harder. It seems the time for long solo expeditions might be drawing to a close. A little nostalgically, he admits 'I've become more of a writer than a traveller'.

Despite his TV series' success, he admits 'TV has changed. It's more gimmicky now. They are not interested in authentic expeditions any more'. Sponsorship is an option but Benedict has principles; 'if I find the perfect sponsor who'd be ready to write a check that would be great, but I don't want to go with a whole load of western gear and advertising'.

He seems increasingly torn between leaving and staying put; 'perhaps I'm just getting older'. Indeed, flipping from the solitude of solo travel to the hectic pace of Shepherd's Bush is a challenge, a culture shock even for the most seasoned traveller.

Benedict considers and shares his secret; 'the main thing is not to get sucked up in the whirligig. I tend to avoid people at first. It's very tempting to leap into social life. I tend to go visit family; that is my mental resource.'

A tight family and basic British cultural values keep him grounded. 'I suppose that is what I plug into. Often it comes down to that: a pint of beer, going to see a movie or something...'

You can take the man out of London...

But, what does such an extraordinary person long for far from home? Apparently,

ordinary things like 'a good hunk of meat'. Although it's available, it's not quite a Sunday roast. He laughs, 'if you are eating monkey day after day, it's very dull.' Luckily, there's no such thing on the menu at his local pub, the Havelock. 'I love going in there just doing ordinary things. That helps me.'

He's also a regular at the Old Parr's Head where he loves the Thai meals. 'This is the great thing about London, all these races and cultures shoved together. I'm not a great fan of multiculturalism, but I love individuals with cultures they bring with them. It could be a nightmare but it's a lovely thing.' He compares the diversity and cosmopolitan side of London to New York, but says it's like nowhere else on earth.

'We are all explorers. If I couldn't go abroad again, I'd find enough to keep me going just in Shepherd's Bush!' Allen finds his turf comforting. He loves the city's reassuring consistency compared with the rapid demise of Nature. 'Things more or less stay the same. The great thing about London is that it has kept a lot of its old heart. You get a sense of the permanence here. A street will go one way, another Post Office will close, but nonetheless you see the eras that have been there before you. London seems to march on.'

After a dozen years in Shepherd's Bush, Allen jokes that he knows all his neighbours but isn't a 'very good neighbourhood watch person!' He loves the village atmosphere of his part of town, 'the familiar faces... the little butcher, the bookshop...'

However, he is contributing to his community by talking to children in local schools. Allen is modest about inspiring the next generation of would-be-adventurers with tales from a real life Indiana Jones. 'I don't know about them being impressed by me, but they are impressed by the places. I tend to emphasise the dramatic bits like when I was shot at! These are the things that tend to grip the young imaginations. I always say: 'you probably don't want to be an explorer... maybe you want to be a ballerina, a chartered accountant or a footballer...but the great thing is I did what I wanted to do so, please just see what I have to say about my life, about believing in myself. Then I tell stories and hope they get involved.'

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# THE RELUCTANT TRAVELLER

Eugene Levy has never had a passion for travel, but the *Schitt's Creek* star gained a whole new outlook when he travelled the globe – from Lapland to Japan via Costa Rica to South Africa – for his new series. Or so he tells Lara Kilner.

I'm not really what you would call a good traveller. It's kind of a personality situation, it's just who I am. There are certain attributes you need, and the curiosity to want to get out there and explore has never been my strong point. Sightseeing is not an experience that I find enjoyable. When it's too hot, I'm uncomfortable, when it's too cold, I'm uncomfortable. Plus I've got a basic palette, I'm a meat and potatoes kind of guy. I love Italy because you're always going to get a good meal, but it makes me nervous to go to a place where I'm not sure what the food is going to be like. Warthog sausages and crocodile schnitzels are not for me. I have a low sense of adventure.

I don't have a travel bucket list, just give me a really decent hotel because I like to make good use of the amenities. I don't want to stay in a fleabag motel. The vacations I'd go on with my wife Deb and the kids [fellow *Schitt's Creek* stars Dan and Sarah Levy] when they were younger were to beach resorts where there wasn't a whole lot on the agenda. We'd get down to the pool every day, have a nice cool drink and decide where to go for dinner. There was not much thinking involved.

I was hesitant about doing a travel show in the beginning, and putting myself out there with all these silly little foibles of mine was definitely a first. But seeing the world doing this show helped me lose my natural cynicism and turned me around in a more

positive way. That's what travelling can do. It can turn your head in ways that only travelling can. I'm still not a gung ho traveller exactly but I think I'm making headway.

The country that was the biggest surprise for me was South Africa. I'd never really wanted to go on a safari and was not excited about the prospect. I have friends who say 'Oh my God, it's so exciting, you must go on a safari' but I just didn't get it. I have a very strong sense of what these animals look like, I've seen them on TV, so did I need to get up at five in the morning to go look at a giraffe wandering across a field? It seems I did because, once I got there, I got it. We stayed at a beautiful hotel, the Kruger Shalati, and I've never seen anything quite like it. It's housed in train carriages on the Shalati Bridge over the Sabie River. The train first brought tourists to the Kruger National Park in the 1920s and would stop on the bridge overnight because it was a hotspot for seeing the Big Five. In the early 70s, they stopped that train route and recently somebody had the idea to put that train permanently on the bridge and turn it into a hotel. The train cars are suites with floor-to-ceiling windows, so I'd wake up and look out every day to see elephants and water buffalo and spot crocodiles heading up the river. The surprising thing for me was that I started to develop a great affinity for the landscape and the animals in a way that I never imagined. We took a trip to a rhino conservation park, where they look after orphans and rhinos who have been badly injured by poachers and hunters, and I got to bottle feed these beautiful 600lb babies and hand-feed a black rhino. The concept of how much danger these animals are in on a day-to-day basis hit me hard. >





For me, a once in a lifetime experience is exactly that. Going on a night hike in the Costa Rican rainforest with snakes and spiders? That's an experience I did not enjoy, I would never have done it and I wouldn't do it again, but at least I tried it. Going up in a helicopter in Utah over the Horseshoe Bend and landing on the sandstone summit of Tower Butte made me crazy. I have a thing with heights, my stomach was churning and it was not a pleasant experience, but I can pat myself on the back for doing it. And I truly did have kind of a good time doing most things – ice fishing in Lapland, not so much, but I loved the huskies and driving a dog sled across a frozen lake was truly an exhilarating experience. I had a lot of fun.

In my own life would I ever have gone to Lapland? I don't think so. I'd heard that eating reindeer is kind of a big thing there and I didn't think I would care for that. I have a tough time with food that's more on the exotic side – if you want to take me for a burger or take me to a Michelin restaurant, I'll opt for the burger seven days a week. I didn't want to tell the people who cooked the reindeer steak for me that I didn't like it, but, it was almost raw and very gamey – I don't care for game and rare is not my thing.

Tokyo was the worst experience for me with food when I was brought out a tray of sushi, eel sashimi and sea urchins. I've never eaten sushi before – for me, cook the fish, put it over a fire and grill it. But the wagyu beef was exceptionally great. I also ate that in Costa Rica, cooked with a crust made with the local coffee, and it was absolutely wonderful.

The accommodation, Nayara Tented Camp, in Costa Rica was a delightful surprise. I've never slept in a tent and, when I heard that it was a tree camp, I was not looking forward to that, but these were luxurious tents built on stilts 30 feet in the air and quite amazing – though I was admiring the overlooking view of the mountain until I was told it was a volcano that had only been dormant for ten years. We were at the foot of it. That was a little too close for comfort for me.

The Amangiri hotel in Utah, meanwhile, was so peaceful, the way the hotel lays in with the landscape in such a natural way. And then there was the Maldives. Other than how long it takes to get there, there is no downside to the Maldives. I stayed on the magical private island of Kudadoo [where a one night stay can cost US\$8,600]. 'Anything, anywhere, anytime' is their concept – our hairstylist said she would love some Polish food and, the next night, they brought her every Polish dish you could imagine. These are islands in the Indian ocean, how do they get this stuff?

But the most memorable aspect of these destinations has been the people I have encountered. Getting to meet their families and dropping myself into their culture is something that has been a really good thing for me because I've always been a very private person – on the shy side, to be honest – so I don't like putting myself out there and I don't readily engage in conversation with people that I don't know. It's been a very positive thing and I've brushed off some cobwebs that have been forming for many, many years."

# IN Travel Gear

James May, hosted Top Gear alongside Jeremy Clarkson and Richard Hammond for 13 years before they defected to Amazon Prime with The Grand Tour. Since 2020, he's been hosting the travel show Our Man In... with series set in Italy, Japan and India. He reminisces with Lara Kilner.

The most shocking thing I've ever experienced while travelling is thinking Richard Hammond had actually died when we were up a mountain in Switzerland. I drove up to see him being dragged out of an upside-down Rimac and there was about ten seconds when I thought 'He's dead, we've actually killed someone', until the sound man said 'It's ok, I can still hear his mic, he's talking'.

There have been emotional highs as well as lows, usually when I'm inadvertently left alone. I drove across the sand dunes in a beach buggy in Namibia and the sand was golden, the sun was setting, the light was diffused, there were misty bits in the sky, and all these fantastic colours came out. It was one of those moments where I thought 'This will never happen again and if I get buried in the sand now and am never found, it doesn't really matter.'

I became curious about the world on a school exchange trip to Karlsruhe in southern Germany. Before that, I'd only ever been on camping holidays, including one to Dorset in 1969 where our tent washed away in a storm and we slept in a council office block for two days. I first met my



exchange partner Armin Göbelbecker in the school hall and thought 'Who is this fat idiot?' He thought 'Who is this scrawny whip?' and we hated each other at first, but we are still friends today. Some kids are traumatised by these exchange trips, but I thought it was amazing being in this incredibly foreign place where all the kids wore leather jackets and were very regimented about fashion. We'd ride around on 50cc mopeds and eat very German things like dampfnudel and sausages in hard bread rolls. It wasn't particularly remarkable but, if you're 14 years old, it's a thrilling adventure.

I then went interrailing and saw things I'd read about in books in places like Florence and, in 1991, went to what was then Yugoslavia. There was a big demonstration in Dubrovnik and an American diplomat told us to leave the country. It took me three days to get out as conflict was starting to kick off, partly spent being rather scared, sleeping on a bench in Zagreb station with some slightly dangerous people lurking about. >

Because my working life was disorganised – it wasn't exactly a career trajectory, more doing odd jobs and getting fired from them – I'd go to a travel agent in Kilburn in the days when you could walk in and say 'Have you got spare seats on any flights?' Once, they said 'you have to go this weekend but you can go with the nuns', so off I went on a charter flight full of nuns to Rome for 30 quid.

These days, when I go on holiday with my partner Sara, we go to the Maldives and sit around eating big prawns, or – I don't want to sound pompous – are keen on educational holidays. Left to my own devices I'd probably have stuck to European historical centres but, doing Top Gear and The Grand Tour, I've been to all sorts of places I wouldn't have encountered, from Botswana to wildernesses in Australia and Mongolia, to the magnetic north pole.

There's been some shocking camping and all of us, at one point or another, have had bad guts to deal with, as well as roads where driving is so debilitating that it destroys the car,

gives you an appalling backache and makes your eyeballs fall out. Sometimes we've had to do that for 10 hours, which makes you want to kill someone, probably yourself. I wouldn't recommend driving to the North Pole – or going to the North Pole by any means, to be honest. It sounds romantic but it's actually pretty boring. Just open your fridge and stick your head in the freezer box instead.

I always crave going back to Japan because I find the aesthetic amazing. You can have an adventure just doing day to day things, like looking at the way things are arranged in shops. It's a feast for the senses.

This is also true of India. Something that has really stuck in my mind was the ceremony at Varanasi next to the holy Ganges, where Hindu pilgrims

A more wonderful journey was flying from La Paz in Bolivia, 17,000 feet above sea level, down into the jungle. It's cold, you get on the aeroplane with what feels like the world's worst hangover and a belting headache from the altitude, and descend into a clearing where the door opens and it's warm, the air is like treacle, you can breathe properly and your head immediately goes 'ping' – it was worth experiencing altitude sickness for that sensation.

gather and there is music, bells ringing, incense blowing around and people in a state of bliss. Then there are cities like Mumbai where there are horns blowing and shouting and pollution and it's all very thrusting but, once you get over that, you go with it and it all makes perfect sense. It works in a different way. You can't bring your Western sensibilities to an Indian city. You've got to just allow India to beat you up a bit. Don't fight it. It's part of the fun.

London has always looked after me. I have lived in both New Zealand and Australia. For various reasons, I have not found them to have been so kind.




## Tell us about your background?

At 16 my Dad took me out of school for a year to travel around Russia, Nepal and India, which had a profound impact on me. I returned to the UK for a bit and started studying mostly online while still travelling for a degree, then masters and then short courses in International Development, Global Learning and child rights' in practice.

## Why Tanzania?

I travelled to east Africa at 18 and a few times after that. My degree was also very much focused on this region of the world. I originally booked a one way ticket to Tanzania and well over 10 years later, two kids and founding an NGO, I'm still here. I absolutely love this wonderful country.

## Tell us how Pamoja Leo came about?

Pamoja Leo's mission was quite a simple one, how do we help babies stay in families and not orphanages? When I discovered that most children in orphanages around the world had families and that poverty, lack of support and bad charity practices were driving kids into orphanages, I really felt like there was a need to do better.

The number one reason a baby ends up in an orphanage for example was if their mum died and their extended family couldn't afford the milk to feed them. So Pamoja Leo's goal was to change these forks in the road type moments. Our

mission has always been to support loving women to be the Mums children need. Sounds simple but we are one of the first charities working in this way of caring for children. Our goal is to respond to orphanhood, abandonment and abuse in a child centred, community and family way. Addressing the roots of the issue.

It all started when I found two children abandoned in the street. That one moment, nearly had those kids in an orphanage, but instead a small group of local women, one government social worker and me ended up reuniting those children with their family. That day led to the founding of the charity!

## It seems like quite an adventurous life.

### Were you always a risk taker?

I guess my slightly nomadic childhood meant I was accustomed to change and wasn't as held back by some of the fears of the unknown, the missing people and maybe a little more ok with being outside my comfort zone.

I like to say I'm a cautious risk taker! You wouldn't catch me bungy jumping but I'm game for backpacking around Tanzania with my two kids on my own any day.

## Any favourite memories that stand out since starting your life in Tanzania?

Seeing children who I once worried if they'd make it through the night as vulnerable newborns, now come and say hello at age seven in their little school uniform. Honestly, nothing better than seeing the power of a little support and a lot of love, and people working together all in one little child out there living their best life!



### What would your advice be for someone wanting to follow in your footsteps?

Take time, seek mentors and advice! No one can do anything alone or in a vacuum. Reach out to others and learn from their wisdom. Balance fearlessness with being informed and prepared, too. The two compliment each other well.

### Any words of wisdom?

It takes a village! No matter what it is motherhood, womanhood, life overseas, founder of a non profit, business, etc. Life flows better when we build a strong community of support.

### Life Motto if you have one?

Not sure I have one but I have a few quotes I love. "Linda Amani Yako" which means protect your peace in Swahili. And "Life isn't about waiting for the storm to pass, it's learning to dance in the rain!"

### Where is "home" now?

Home is Tanzania. I'm 10 years here now and that's the longest I have lived in any one place. But home is also a little bit of an abstract concept to me and it's fully about a specific place.

### Expat or local?

Honestly neither. I tend to say I stay away too long to feel like an expat but not long enough to feel local.

### Any pros/cons to life as an expat?

Pros include gorgeous friendships and connections. In the isolation of being

overseas there is a beauty in the connections you can create with others, too. In my experience the connections I've made have been so meaningful and deep.

You learn to see life from so many different angles. It's less about a right way and a wrong way but this gorgeous rainbow of different ways, different cultures approach life! I've found that to be such a gift of a life overseas.

Cons: Goodbyes! To family and loved ones. I have five siblings living on four different continents. My kids don't get to see their grandparents as much as we would all like. That's hard.

Misunderstanding can lead to frustration and feeling isolated. Cultural and language barrier means inevitable misunderstandings. These can be hard at times.

### In another life I would have been...

Ohh I think maybe a child physiologist. Or a full time traveller!!

# A Wild Ride

Emma Jane Levin is the owner of Ride Egypt, an equestrian company offering riding holidays and excursions in Egypt. She swapped London for Luxor a decade ago.

“Embrace every single challenge with courage, resilience and a sense of adventure.”

I grew up in the picturesque New Forest, where my fascination with horses first took root. Like many children, I traded stable work for rides, forging an early love for these magnificent creatures. However, my riding experiences were sporadic due to frequent relocations, until I settled in Richmond, London, and it was there that I fell deeply in love with a grumpy old ex-show jumper named Fletch. Losing him to a devastating injury marked a turning point, reinforcing my profound connection with horses and introducing me to the idea of travelling with horses.

#### Why Egypt?

My journey to Egypt was unexpected, spurred by a sudden breakup and a need for solace. Seeking refuge in Sharm, Egypt, I stumbled upon a local stable and rediscovered my passion for riding. Meeting Belal, a majestic black stallion, reignited my love for horses and sparked a desire to improve their welfare in Egypt. Despite the challenges of rusty riding skills and unfamiliar desert terrain, I was drawn to the beauty and potential of Egypt's equestrian landscape.

#### Any favourite moments?

Embarking on the Ride Egypt venture was undoubtedly a risk, but one fuelled by passion and determination. From rescuing neglected horses on the beach to overcoming setbacks like financial losses and betrayal, the journey has been both challenging and rewarding. Yet, amidst the trials, there are countless memories: witnessing the joy of guests exploring Egypt's wonders on horseback, forging deep connections with my horses, and reclaiming the Ride Egypt name after adversity struck. These moments fuel my resolve to continue sharing the beauty of Egypt's landscapes and its rich equestrian heritage.

I have two favourite memories – the first would have to be being reunited with Belal two years after meeting him, shortly followed by the memory of signing the papers to buy him so he would be forever mine. And a close second would be Far and Ride being the first agency to believe in me and give me a chance. We had a meeting at their home, and I remember it was Christmas Eve and the house smelt of



mince pies and Christmas. I drank gin for the first time and trains were every two hours back to London. I missed my train back by a couple of minutes and had to sit in the cold for two hours waiting for the next one, but I was so happy I didn't care. I will always have this as a favourite memory.

#### Any Words of Wisdom?

For those considering a similar path, I would urge you to embrace challenges with courage and resilience – it takes bravery and guts and a lot of work (at one point I was working three jobs in London just to fund the building of my new stables) Trust your instincts, prioritise integrity in all endeavours, and cultivate meaningful connections with both animals and people. Remember that setbacks are opportunities for growth, and passion will sustain you through the toughest times.

#### How do you manage a situation where one rider has more advanced riding skills than their partner, or when a participant is a complete beginner?

We actually have a set criteria for accepting people on our riding holidays, it's listed several times throughout our website, reconfirming on the guests' invoices prior to payment plus in our welcome packs. Guests fill in rider forms also and send them back to us with information of their riding history, horse personalities they enjoy, etc. We do also understand it can be a little nerve-wracking on the first rides together, so we always have breakfast with our groups pre ride to go over anything again. First horses I tend to call "holiday" horses for their first rides anyway. These are fabulous well-trained horses, responsible and respectful with easy steering and breaks. If someone wants a super spicy horse and we feel they are capable we can always provide these also. We get a sixth sense when listening to guests as to which horses would suit them. Our favourite saying is how much chilli do you want with your horse. In cases where we have less experienced riders we always have enough horses and guides to be able to separate guests or make two small groups so everyone can enjoy their own paces. Our entry level is to be able to canter on a well-trained horse unaided in an open space.



#### Who might you have been in another life?

The Egyptians tell me I look like Cleopatra so I guess this would be the safe answer – but the woman I really respect is Hatshepsut as she was a strong female in a man's world and she broke the rules and rocked it.

#### Expat or Local?

Egypt has become my home, and I've immersed myself in its rich cultural tapestry. As an expatriate, I've navigated challenges such as cultural adaptation and bureaucratic hurdles, but the rewards have been immeasurable. Living amidst Egypt's diverse landscapes, sharing my love for horses with guests from around the world, and exploring its ancient wonders have enriched my life beyond measure. Despite the occasional hurdles, I cherish the opportunity to forge my own path, create lasting memories and make a positive impact through Ride Egypt's equestrian adventures.

## Happy family travel - myth or reality?

We think it's both, actually. A lot of times it's just hard, and we wonder why we're doing this. But as time goes by, some of our toughest travel times become our favourite memories. But maybe this just exposes a character flaw in us.

## Best piece of advice on travelling with kids?

Be present. I think anyone who takes their kids travelling must love them, no? So maybe you owe it to yourself and your kids to be off your phone, available, and fully engaged. Your kids may not want to hang out with you forever. I think, personally, we have about four years before our window closes (but then I'll make them go to group therapy so we can still "hang out").

## Three Best Travel Hacks you actually use?

- 1) My kids really don't touch many electronic devices except for when they're on aeroplanes. If your kids are bored on the aeroplane, you'll be miserable. So bring plenty of objects for entertainment. All the objects. Every single one. Not exactly a hack, just common sense sometimes forgotten.
- 2) Follow the flight deals. For example, search "anywhere" or "Europe" or "I just want to leave my damn city" when searching for flights on, say, Skyscanner or Google Flights. Then just head out alone in the middle of the night, being sure to call your very confused spouse in the morning with a rough estimate of your whereabouts and potential return date.

- 3) Credit card points. The more I buy, the more free things I get. Thus, wanting lots of free things, I buy a lot. It almost seems too good to be true.

## Plan or wing it?

## Best way to save money while travelling?

Make sure your credit card has no foreign transaction fees. Make sure your



bank reimburses your ATM fees. Always reject the credit card currency conversion. Try to pay with your credit card in the local currency. Skip the fancy dinners. Kids don't appreciate the Michelin restaurants at all. Try to find a good city pass (which will sometimes allow you to visit something like eight thousand places for the price of two).

#### How many World Wonders have you seen? Which one is the best?

#### Best/Worst accommodation ever?

The Algarve in southern Portugal. When we drive there from our home in Spain, it almost feels like another country.

The price. Since we're a family of five, our options are two rooms

or the Presidential Suite. It's rarely anything in between. Another source of anxiety is whether the two rooms will be on the same floor and whether the champagne will be properly chilled in the Presidential Suite.

#### Best bits about being on the road?

The road = freedom. I crave the newness of everything. The challenge. The break from monotony.

#### Any places still on your "bucket list" to visit?

Why? Yes, Madagascar is calling. It's not widely travelled and looks stellar in terms of flora and fauna.

#### Any place you'll be going back to... again and again? Why?

We don't love repeating places. But I

# POV: SOLO TRAVEL CHANGED MY LIFE



Emily Damom swapped a life in Chicago for one on the road, shared with her 155k Tik Tok followers.

She tells WHEREVER how solo travel enriches the soul.

When the boutique interior design firm in Chicago for which I was working was forced to close due to the pandemic, I saw it as an opportunity to travel. With my newly-found freedom after being laid off, I decided to spend six weeks in Dubrovnik, Croatia. The historic walled city, usually overrun with cruise ship day visitors, was left for the locals as no cruise ships were operating at that time. Some of the luxury hotels were also temporarily closed. One of these hotels allowed locals to use its formal gardens and to swim from their private dock. It was my “secret garden” to visit daily for a swim and picnic lunch.

After Croatia, I took an overnight boat to Italy, then a train to Switzerland, and finally, I flew to Istanbul, Turkey. It was a trip that included four different languages, cultures and city architecture.

In each city I visited, I stayed in Airbnb apartments to feel more like a local. I selected homes with real character and enjoyed staying in spaces with varying design styles.

Returning to Chicago, feeling confident from months of solo travel, I decided to go to Bali for an extended stay. My arrival in Bali started with a five-day mandatory quarantine in total isolation. Shortly after my arrival, in response to the pandemic, Bali closed its borders for entry to the world. This meant I had seven months to experience Bali like few have known. Even though I was initially terrified, I learned to ride a motor scooter and it became a source of joy.

After spending seven months in Bali, I missed the history and culture of Europe and decided to come to Portugal. I spent a month in the spring of 2022 in Portugal visiting Porto, Lisbon and the Algarve region. I quickly decided I could make my home in Lisbon. Some of the determining factors included friendly locals, the vibrant architecture, and feeling safe as a solo female.

My original plan was to rent an apartment, but when I visited a beautiful loft in the historic city centre, I immediately knew I wanted to buy the property and make it my home. My home was a source of joy and evolved slowly as I navigated a new country on my own.

One of my most exciting solo trips after moving to Lisbon was to Marrakesh and the Agafay Desert in Morocco. Marrakesh is an easy 90-minute flight from Lisbon, yet offers a completely different culture and landscape. Some of the highlights

included navigating the markets on my own, negotiating for traditional Moroccan rugs, visiting a hammam, sleeping in a tent and riding a camel in the desert.

I have shared a visual diary of my travels on Tik Tok/Instagram to inspire other women who want to travel but are scared to do it solo. My motto is “be scared but do it anyways”.

You gain confidence as you go until it feels completely natural to be on your own—navigating directions, dining out alone, making an acquaintance at the local coffee shop, etc.

When you are a solo traveller, you have experiences that you would not have if you had a companion. People talk to you, share their stories, and you observe details that you might otherwise miss. Solo travel has been incredibly enriching and life changing for me.

## Learning to love exactly where you are.

Where should we go on holiday this summer?" my British husband asked.

"Haven't we literally just been on holiday?" I replied, "Like less than two weeks ago?"

No one else would dream of saying such a thing, but I did, because I'm American and I was raised in a country that has no legal paid leave. I'd lived in London almost ten years, but the idea of multiple vacations a year was still incredibly hard for me to grasp.

According to Forbes Magazine, the average American is lucky to get 10 days of paid holiday per year. After five years of service this could increase to 15 days; after 10 years you might get 17. Meanwhile, most European countries give workers more than a month of paid vacation per year.

"As expats, all of us live in some of the greatest cities on earth – our everyday "downtime" is already sublime. Sometimes all we have to do is see it."

I'm sure you have heard the majority of Americans do not have passports and this is absolutely true. (The US State Department reports that only 37% of Americans own a valid passport; compare that to 75% of the Brits.) But this isn't because they lack curiosity or wanderlust. This is mainly because with so few days of paid leave, they simply don't have time to travel for anything other than seeing their family at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

In this environment, regular holidays abroad can't and don't happen as a matter of course.

Instead, Americans go crazy with other kinds of holidays: Valentines Day, Easter, Halloween, etc – making sure their homes, meals and outfits are completely thematic according to the season. Because without constant foreign travel, you have to think of ways to break up the monotony of the year.

There are rarely any lessons to glean from America, but the idea of learning to love exactly where you are is one of them.

I tried to explain this to my husband: How about instead of constantly, obsessively planning the next holiday, we focus on creating a life that we don't feel the need to escape from?

It was hard for him to flip his cultural paradigm so quickly. After all, he'd been brainwashed into believing that true joy and relaxation can only occur when sitting on a lounge chair in a foreign country.

I wasn't saying we should forgo all travel (far from it), but I wanted us to be capable of happiness, even when we weren't travelling.

I don't mean staycations. I mean having neighbours over for casual drinks or an impromptu BBQ, or walking around the local parks, or Sunday brunch in your favourite neighbourhood spot. I love London so much and I'm so thankful to live here that I could easily do these three things over and over again and die happy. (And none of it requires packing lists, or last-minute pedicures, or dog-sitters or figuring out how to use airmiles – much less lugging travel cots, strollers and car seats through the airport.)

## Welcome to Toytown

In late 2015 as I was sitting in traffic in Richmond, with four crying children on the backseat, only a mile distant, but hours away, I realised we needed to leave the big smoke. Our destination? Salzburg - A Toytown in the Alps.

In the background, the majestic Untersberg rises to close to 6,000 feet. The peak is snow-covered most of the year. A few miles away there are enormous freshwater lakes of the clearest blue, surrounded by a very Austrian combination of a wild and manicured countryside. Salzburg is an architectural treasure trove. The mix of mediaeval and baroque buildings in the town centre gives the curious eye a great deal to contemplate. One never quite gets over the legerete of the scene. It civilises.

Sitting atop the Monchsberg, one finds the Fortress. It stood guard over the wealthy populace for a thousand years. The last weekend of April, a foot of snow fell in and around the city; the week after, there we were, one and all, celebrating summer's precocious arrival.

The weather keeps you on your guard. It can get cold and dark very quickly, but in this ancient land, hope is a promise that is always fulfilled. For children, the peace of the society the Austrians built, the winter snows and summer's heat make it a European Garden of Eden. For us parents, hearing the children laugh, run around, ski in winter and swim in summer - safe and sound - it surely is.

First of all, there's exploring the boat with its many nooks and crannies. Although up at dawn I was still late and stuck in a traffic jam. I didn't mind because I was surrounded by lovely old cars. Austins, Morris, Rovers, MG's, every marque is represented, even 1950s Rolls and Bentleys, and we were all on the way to The 81st Members' Meeting at Goodwood.

The Members' Meeting is a weekend of historic motor racing, offering the enthusiast a full menu of racing, on track displays, music and even fireworks. You need to make a plan as there is so much to see and do. Study the circuit map and timetable, make a note of where the eateries and toilets are because you don't want to miss any of the action.

There are over a dozen races and lots of on track displays from Edwardian racing cars, Can-Am sports cars, Formula 1s, and making a debut this year, motorcycle sidecars. We all know that racing drivers are jolly types, happy to explain exactly how they have vanquished their fellow competitors. Sidecar racers are different, they aren't like the rest of us normal types.

This was the first time I'd seen sidecars in action. The idea is that the driver drives and the passenger jumps from side to side to change the balance of the bike through the bendy bits, all this insanity happens an inch off the ground at 160mph.

I'd be terrified and hanging on for dear life but after the event they look like they have had a sedate drive to the local supermarket and managed to get a particularly good deal on tea bags.

Motor racing is like ballet, the cars describing graceful arcs as they four-wheel drift, their engines providing the orchestra. At Goodwood you can get really close to this music, in the paddock and out on the circuit. I recommend the left handed bend called St. Mary's. From here you can get up close to the action.


I found a gap in my timetable and decided to enjoy a spot of lunch. Although there is food available all around the circuit, I decided to eat in a re-creation of the Great

After lunch there was more on track action, with a demonstration of the hugely powerful Can-Am sports racing cars and Gerhard Berger blasted around the track in his 1989 Formula 1 Ferrari. Races at this event are named after famous drivers and riders and the last race of the day was in honour of the illustrious racer, Gordon Spice. >

This was a two-driver race for saloon cars from the 1970s and early 80s. As it started at 6:45pm, the cars raced into the dusk with the aroma of an English spring rising from the damp earth, with the backdrop of the South Downs and the Edwardian carousel thumping out tunes as the headlights flashed past the pits. I wonder if this is as close to motoring heaven you can get?

As the race ended I became aware of a syncopated drumming. I assumed someone was having a party but it was a 56-piece Brazilian street band. As they were being followed by a procession of tweed-covered race goers, I stepped in line trying to emulate some of their rhythmic moves. The band led through trees lit by fairy lights to an area with lots of places to buy food and where various bands performed

there really early but thousands of others had the same thought. I picked a spot on the roof of the pits, which is a great place to watch the race start. It's also a great place to survey the paddock, which looks beautiful with its blossom trees and historic racing cars.

The first winner of the Monaco Grand Prix, William Grover Williams, was celebrated in an all-Bugatti race. Niki Lauda was also celebrated by an on track display of his championship winning McLaren and he, like William Grover Williams, was so much more than "just a racing driver".

After another lunch at Hogwarts dining hall, I watched from the chicane and from here you can see the concentration on the face of the drivers; but I suggest you wear ear plugs because the cars are accelerating hard so using all of their revs.

After the last race a tranquillity descends. Spectators wander around the paddock to drink in the last of their weekend and, as they make their way back across the fields to their cars, content and happy, they imagine they too could drive these cars.

When the last transporter leaves and the gates of the circuit are shut the fox and the badger reclaim their territory and sniff the damp earth of an English spring.





Questions are my business. I love questions. These days very few are simple, most are complex. Across sectors in which we provide guidance we continue to see an increase in complex questions from prospective clients. It's a tough start for a novice writer, like me, so I thought I would report on the common questions posed across the investment, taxation, legal and immigration sectors.

### How do I balance my personal privacy and compliance?

Transparency obligations are being intensified by governments. Protecting your personal information and balancing compliance is a growing concern. This is a question that is relevant to all of us regardless of our wealth. Ensuring that information shared by financial institutions is correct so as not to trigger penalties or audits. Understanding specific legal and regulatory requirements governing privacy rights and tax compliance in the jurisdictions relevant to your life. Our geographical mobility has grown, and for individuals who hold assets the rise of data security has increased. What makes a real difference is the bringing together of your investment, tax and legal advisors where they work holistically, communicatively and the flow of information is managed for you.

### Is NHR ending?

The end of the NHR regime was determined by the State Budget Law 2024. The end date was determined from 1st January 2024. Do I fall under the criteria still available to apply until March 2025? That's the question!

### I am a non-resident with capital gains arising. What should I do?

Clients are individuals first and foremost. How to help depends on the direction of their future, complexities, priorities and lifestyle. Advice should always be bespoke and not universal. For example, are gains arising from the sale of a holiday home held for many years? Are you selling a holiday home in

order to upscale to a larger property as you have decided to move permanently? Are you selling a rental property? Many individuals receive blinkered advice because their advisor did not ask them enough questions.

### Is there a replacement for NHR?

There is a new program. ITS — Incentivised Tax Status Program or Tax Incentive for Scientific Research and Innovation. This program was proposed in the State Budget. The criterion for this program differs from NHR. Would it be the right fit for you? Perhaps. Take advice.

### Basic advice for a US citizen moving to Portugal?

Portugal is on the radar for US citizens, and rightly so. Basic steps to consider include visas, location and taxes. US citizens are required to obtain a visa to relocate. Depending on your eligibility and circumstances there are options for suitable visa types.

Location, location, location. Finding the right location to settle is tough in Portugal. Far too many wonderful options in all regions. Buy or rent?

Taxation. Navigating the US and Portuguese systems is a challenge. Having a dual handler managing both accountants in their respective jurisdictions is a great benefit.

### What should I be looking for when seeking any advice in Portugal?

Rapport. The rapport between you and your advisor and beyond, between each and all your advisors across sectors. Without that rapport the ability to uphold each individual client's needs can disintegrate. Should you be an entrepreneur with apartments in different countries, with revenue arising from multiple sources, that quality of rapport expands to help consolidate assets, taxation and others. I value rapport.





international market and this has not changed. Without a doubt there are some nationalities that were less frequent in the Golden Triangle and that we are now starting to notice are more recurrent.



**What is your percentage of expatriate clients?**


# My Bica

After living in remote parts of the country running vineyards for far too many years, I wanted to be immersed in Lisbon life, close to the city centre. The property market was crazy, even then and we ended up buying the flat having only seen it by torchlight as the electricity had been cut off. What sealed the deal was the three-minute walk to the breathtaking Miradouro de Santa Catarina. We put in an offer over an imperial, watching the sunset over the Tagus. The flat has probably appreciated by 30% since then – not a bad return!



Everywhere is either up a steep hill or down a lot of steps. If you go down, towards Cais do Sodré, there is a great little place for lunch at Popular da Bica. The pratos do dia are inexpensive and very good. It's very much a place for locals – the policeman, the architect who works nearby and the postman who pauses mid-round for a glass of moscatel, all sitting at the same table. A few short steps away is the Time Out market.



Superfrutas do Calhariz has fantastic fresh fruit and vegetables, a deli counter and basic staples. Regular customers always find a free bunch of coriander put into their shopping bags. If I need to buy bread I stop off at Chiado Caffe, where I might also need a small beer to keep myself hydrated. Also the laços de mel at Pastelaria Orion at the top of the Elevador are to die for.



If I'm splashing out I might even consider the magnificent espetada de gambas at Principe do Calhariz, which also does the best ameijoas à bulhão pato in the city, or dinner at my friend Fernando's excellent Lisboa é Linda. His effervescent brother Nuno, behind the bar, will ask you a couple of questions and then invent a bespoke cocktail that you could have never imagined was exactly what you had been dreaming of, but hadn't been able to put into words.

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



# SAND DUNES, SILENCE AND SKY

Theresa Devereux takes a two night desert camp trek in the UAE to find the heart of the Arabian Desert.

I am hanging on for dear life in the back seat of the four-wheel drive as we hurtle across the sandy, undulating planes of the Liwa desert on the southern end of Abu Dhabi, in the United Arab Emirates. The car takes a dramatic turn and our driver pauses for a second as the car teeters on a near-vertical slope as he navigates the descent down a huge sand dune. I am terrified, not that I lacked faith in our emirate friend and driver to whom this desert is home. I can see he is an expert as he skilfully negotiates the twists and turns and steep descents with ease and chats happily to my friend, in the front. He looks surprised when he catches a glimpse of my panicked expression in the rear mirror. "Would you like me to slow down?" he asks kindly.

We are on the first stage of a two-night desert camp and trek and we are driving on the northern edge of the Rub' al Khali, otherwise known as the empty quarter. It is the largest area of continuous sand in the world,

approximately 1,000km long and 500km wide, and covers almost the entire Southern Arabian Peninsula, stretching into Saudi Arabia on the west, the UAE on the north and to a lesser extent, Yemen in the south and Oman in the east. The heart of the Arabian desert, it is now largely uninhabited but was once home to the nomadic Bedouin tribes. It was also crossed twice by the famous British explorer, Wilfred Thesiger, who wrote about his epic journeys in his book 'Arabian Sands'.

Ok, so our trip was not exactly Thesiger, who, with his Bedouin companions, crossed this inhospitable terrain in the late 1940's, on foot and camel, often thirsty and hungry while being pursued by raiding parties intent on killing him. But it was enough of a taste to have huge admiration for the man and the Bedouin tribes who survived on this land for centuries.

Our friend drops us off at a beautiful spot he knew about an hour's drive into the desert near the Saudi Arabian border. He will be back to check on us and I watch his Land Rover disappear out of sight in a trail of dust over a sand dune. It is only later that my anxiety over the "what ifs" set in. At this moment, I am too excited to be here to care about anything.

We set up camp on a wide, flat-bottomed bowl where we will be protected from the wind. There are risks and you need to know

where it is safest to camp in the sand dunes. To get mobile reception you have to climb to the top of the dunes. I eye the top rim of the dune that half encircles our tiny camp. From my angle the slip face is about 10 to 15 metres high and looks almost vertical. I wasn't sure if I could manage to get up there but it wasn't as hard as it looked, a bit like walking up a ski slope, apart from the final bit where I had to haul myself up. Even that, I had mastered by the end of the two days, using walking sticks and a good lean forward.

The view from the top was utterly, utterly beautiful. A sea of endless rolling, orange sand dunes in every direction as far as the eye can see. Angular edges, pointed and rounded mounds of sand, layer upon layer, in both shadow and light as a white orange sun, a burning globe descends across the sky casting shadows beneath white and yellow rays. The top half of the picture, a beautiful blue, the bottom half, a sparkling golden orange, and way, away in the distance, a few twinkling lights of civilization. On one side, carved along the desert floor, there was an enormously wide, flat, meandering plain, interrupted at intervals by lakes of silver, glinting in the sun. “Sabkhas” says my travelling companion who has camped and trekked here many times, “Dried out salt flats” she explains. I can see three; massive crevices, tracking each other in succession.



The next day, we trek out from our camp, walking up and down the dunes for several hours in walking boots and gaiters zipped around our ankles to keep the sand out. We follow the line of the sabkhas in the distance, clinging to the long sharp edges of the sand dunes known as the ‘shoulder’. You expect the sand to crumble here, under your feet, but it doesn't, it is where the sand is at its hardest and better to walk on. It would be so easy to get lost but we have a GPS and leave landmarks at various points along the way. On our way back, we follow the fresh imprints our footsteps made in the sand on the way out. It is beautiful and endless and harsh, but not too harsh and our traditional Arab scarves, known in the Middle East as the shemagh, ghutrah or keffiyeh, shield us from the hot sun and wind. The scarf is made from cotton and it is the perfect thickness, size and texture for the task, and I found it incredibly versatile, light weight and easily transportable.

We are back at the camp before dusk and I call my family from the top of the steep sand dune. “I am in the middle of nowhere” I shout excitedly. “It is amazing. You have to come.” And the sun sinks below the desert floor and the night sky sweeps in without me even realising it, like a deep, dark blue blanket. The top half of the picture goes black and so does the bottom half apart from the flickering light of the fire we have made out of logs in some scooped-out sand. And later on, from my sleeping bag, lying beside my friend and the dying embers of the fire, woolly hats and socks on, because, yes, it really can get cold in the desert at night, I watch the ocean of twinkling stars above and the moon peeping out from behind a dune and make its way, very slowly, across the night sky, casting an almost celestial light that grows in intensity as the night progresses. It is so quiet. It is mesmerizingly beautiful, and a line from TheSiger's ‘Arabian nights’ comes to mind.

“It was very still,” he wrote, “with the silence which we have driven from our world.”



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
